


## Year 8 Super Hero's: MUSIC

#### **Musical Vocabulary**

Tempo: The speed of the music—Fast (Allegro) Slow (Largo) Moderate (moderato)

Dynamics: The volume of the music—Loud (Forte) Quiet (Piano) Gradually getting louder (Crescendo) Gradually getting quieter (Diminuendo).

Instrumentation: What instruments are being used in the piece.

Leitmotif: Theme tune that represents a character, mood, object or emotion.

Ostinato: A repeated pattern of notes

Pedal Note: A long held bass note

Chord: More than one note played at once

Bassline: The lower part, played by the left hand

Melody: The main tune within the piece.

Major: A happy sounding key that the music is written in.

Tonality: The key the music is written in i.e. Major/ Minor

Unison: Together singing or playing the same melody line.

Time signature: Tells the performer how many beats per bar.

Crotchet: 1 beat note

Quaver: 1/2 beat note

#### Military influences

Music has been prominent in the military for many hundred of years.

- Brass instruments—horn was used as a war cry and represented powerful figures.
- Use of drums—snare and bass
- Use of marches
- Use of Fanfares

The history of superhero music can be traced back to the early days of film and radio, with the first superhero film soundtracks appearing in the 1940s.

One of the earliest examples is the score for the 1941 film "Superman," which featured a dramatic orchestral score composed by Leo Erdody.

Composers such as John Williams, who composed the iconic theme for the 1978 "Superman" film, and Danny Elfman, who composed the theme for the 1989 "Batman" film, created music that became synonymous with the characters and helped to define the genre.


#### **Richard Wagner:**




